# MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

O13 marks the 50th anniversary of the Asian Cultural Council. As we reach this milestone, it is a time to both reflect on the past and envision the possibilities of our future. As I think back, I am reminded of a story our founder John D. Rockefeller 3rd shared, describing a pivotal moment that would help affirm his conviction in the importance of cultural exchange. He wrote, "I was visiting Kuala Lumpur, and I accompanied the U.S. Ambassador to Malaysia one evening to a concert given by a young American baritone, William Warfield, whose fine voice was matched by his warm personality. It was an exciting and moving evening. Afterward, the Ambassador said to me: 'He has accomplished more for U.S.-Malaysian relations in two hours than I do over a period of many months.'"

At ACC, we are privileged to witness such moments first-hand and often. We are struck by our grantees who can powerfully move an audience, whether in the course of a performance or presentation, through a painting or article, or simply through conversation. They inspire us to discover commonalities and, importantly, to embrace difference.

Our anniversary created many of these moments. In May, we launched our 50th-year celebration in New York City with Dance Taipei, a presentation of works by four Taiwanese choreographers — Fang-Yi Sheu, Huang Yi, Chou Shu-Yi, and Cheng Tsung-Lung, all ACC grantees — in a sold-out three-day engagement. Later that month, in Hong Kong, famed violinist Midori Goto gifted her talents to ACC and over 600 audience members in a solo performance of Bach, followed by a community outreach and education program. In November, ACC hosted gala events in Taipei and Manila, where each celebration centered around the work of our grantees. Our evening in Taipei featured many alumni: a presentation by celebrated Japanese puppetmaster Masaya Kiritake and musical performances of Ng Chong-Leong, Sun Son Theatre, and Rahic Talif, against a backdrop created by Liu Shih-Tung and lighting designed by Lee Chien-Chang. In Manila, the heartfelt

celebration was made possible by the dedicated efforts from 14 alumni, including Loy Arcenas, Chris Millado, Gino Gonzales, Edna Vida Froilan, Myra Beltran, Bong Cabrera, Josefina Estrella, Patrick Duarte Flores, Ma. Teresa Jamias, Nestor Jardin, Alden Lugnasin, Antonio Maigue, Jorge Ortoll and Ballet Philippines. Arriving in Manila only five days after Typhoon Haiyan/Yolanda struck the Philippines, we questioned whether an anniversary celebration was appropriate. However, our gathering, themed "Biyaya" (Gift)," reminded us to be thankful and the evening proved to be a symbol of hope and resilience.

As I write these words reflecting on 2013, I also share my excitement about our anniversary events to come in Shanghai, Tokyo, Yokohama, Hong Kong, and culminating in New York City at a gala benefit on November 18, 2014. I look forward to each of these gatherings as an opportunity to create connections among people and share the extraordinary work of our grantees.

I would also like to thank our patrons for their unfailing support and belief in our efforts; our stellar board and my tireless colleagues who guide our work, year after year; and John D. Rockefeller 3rd and his family for this prescient vision and their generosity.

Fifty years ago, JDR 3rd began our program because he trusted the power of the individual. He believed that person-to-person exchange was crucial in promoting understanding and respect and that this would in turn enable peace and amity in the world.

We hope that you will join us to celebrate — through our 50th anniversary and for many years to come — the work of our grantees and that together we can continue to realize the promise of this vision.

### PROGRAM OVFRVIEW

he goal of ACC's grant-making stems from a philosophy that embraces the essential power of cultural exchange to connect peoples and promote mutual understanding. The primary mechanism for the activity supported by ACC has been through fellowships to individuals, and our grantees have become influential thinkers, artists, and specialists whose work has significantly advanced understanding between the United States and Asia, and among the countries of Asia. We have also extended support to organizations, and the goal of this funding activity has always been to maximize transformative impact on the individuals participating in important projects and, ultimately, on communities.

In 2013, ACC made a total of 96 grants to exceptional individuals and organizations from the United States and 15 countries in Asia. These grants represent a wide range of activity, from Western classical vocal study to textile research in central Asia, from physical theater to theater arts management—all amounting to meaningful beginnings for even greater future work from these extraordinary grantees.

In 2013, the Afghanistan National Institute of Music (ANIM) embarked on their historic first U.S. tour with support from the ACC. The tour initiated at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. They also performed at the State Department, the Italian Embassy and the World Bank then moved on to Carnegie Hall in New York, culminating in a residency and concert at Boston's New England Conservatory. These concerts featured the Afghan Youth Orchestra (AYO) and other ANIM ensembles performing orchestral and chamber music on both Western and traditional instruments.



**Xiangqian Hu** received a six-month grant to participate in a residency program and observe trends in performance art in New York City. An extremely thoughtful and deliberate artist, Hu employs performance art to explore social situations, gaps in communication, and issues of identity. At the end of his fellowship, Hu arranged to make a performance at the Cathedral of Saint John the Divine in upper Manhattan. This performance, titled *The Public Speaker Who Forgot His Words*, took place in July 2014.



Dian Inawati Mahendra received a four-month grant to observe contemporary arts practices, visit museums and galleries, and meet with curators, artists, and arts administrators in the U.S. Gallery Manager for Komunitas Salihara in Jakarta, one of Indonesia's most important and influential alternative art spaces, Mahendra had the opportunity to meet an extraordinary range of arts professionals in New York. In November 2013 alone, she attended over 25 programs at Performa13, the biennial festival of performance art held in NY. Back in Indonesia, Mahendra wrote, "The ACC Fellowship has given me an opportunity to see various possibilities that I have never seen before in arts management. Knowing that those possibilities are available makes me more confident to work in this area and, at the same time gives me confidence to try new approaches in arts management within the Indonesian context."

Deepak Rauniyar Independent filmmaker Deepak Rauniyar received a grant to collaborate on a film script with screenwriter David Barker in New York City. Rauniyar's first feature film, *Highway*, was critically acclaimed both in Nepal and internationally, and his new project, *White Sun*, which explores social realities of life in a post-war Nepalese village, is being anticipated with great interest. During his New York-based fellowship Rauniyar was invited to participate in the Talent Lab of the Toronto Film Festival, as well as the International Film Festival of Rotterdam in the Netherlands, and to speak at Harvard University. Writing of his experience, Rauniyar states that it transformed his life, his understanding of cinema, and his career as a filmmaker. 

### JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER 3RD AWARD

he Asian Cultural Council presents the John D. Rockefeller 3rd Award to an individual from Asia or the United States who has made a significant contribution to the international understanding, practice, or study of the visual or performing arts of Asia. This award for outstanding professional achievement commemorates the deep and longstanding interest of John D. Rockefeller 3rd in Asian art and culture. Funds for the Award are made possible by an endowment gift to the Asian Cultural Council from The JDR 3rd Fund.

In honor of ACC's 50th Anniversary three Awards were given in 2013, marking the first time the prestigious honor was given to more than one recipient in a single year.



### Pichet Klunchun

Pichet Klunchun, born in 1971, is internationally recognized as the finest male classical Thai dancer of his generation and the individual in whom lies the greatest hope for the future continuity and vitality of his art. Trained in Khon (dance of the Thai royal court) from one of the form's great masters, Mr. Klunchun is acknowledged by his teachers and peers to be an exemplar who combines brilliant technique, thorough knowledge of the tradition, boundless creativity, and a commitment to teaching.



### Amna Kusumo

Amna Kusumo is a pioneer in the field of arts management in Southeast Asia. Through her visionary work, which has included introducing new ideas about arts administration and resource sharing, she has helped to establish a national arts infrastructure in Indonesia that has allowed various art forms from her country to be known and appreciated throughout the world. She has collaborated with the Jakarta Arts Council to create innovative international programming and to formulate policies to support the activities and development of the arts in Jakarta and throughout Indonesia.



### **Chinary Ung**

Chinary Ung is an internationally acclaimed composer, a gifted teacher, and an activist for creativity in Southeast Asia. Born in Cambodia in 1942, Mr. Ung came to the United States in 1968 to study clarinet at the Manhattan School of Music. Mr. Una went on to have a very successful career in composition and university teaching. His numerous awards include a Guggenheim Fellowship, two Kennedy Center prizes, the American Academy of Arts and Letters Fellowship, and the illustrious Grawemeyer Award, music composition's highest award.




