Our History

The Asian Cultural Council (ACC) was founded as the JDR 3rd Fund by John D. Rockefeller 3rd to establish a direct, personalized approach to fostering understanding and respect between Asia and the U.S. through the exchange of artists and specialists in the visual and performing arts.

The ACC Hong Kong Arts Program was founded in 1986 with the help of Kenneth H.C. Fung and a dedicated group of donors, which became ACC Hong Kong's first Friends' Committee, chaired by the late J.S. Lee as well as Mr. Fung.

Since 2015, the Hong Kong Arts Program has operated under the auspices of the Asian Cultural Council (HK) Foundation Limited (ACCHKF), an officially registered charitable institution in Hong Kong under Section 88 of the Inland Revenue Ordinance.

ACCHKF is chaired by Hans Michael Jebsen and supported by generous patrons and foundations.

Our Fellows & Network

For more than 50 years, ACC has awarded close to 6000 fully-customized fellowships and grants to arts professionals and institutions. Six hundred fellowships and grants have been awarded to individuals from China, Hong Kong and Macau. These outstanding individuals participated in ACC's transformative cultural exchange experiences in the U.S. and other Asian countries. Many of ACC's alumni, including Cai Guo-Qiang (1995 Fellow), Chen Kaige (1986 - 1988 Fellow), and Wucius Wong (1971 Fellow), received ACC's support in the early stages of their careers and are now powerfully shaping the vibrant cultural landscape across Asia. These cultural leaders make up ACC's robust network of support across the globe and continue to contribute to the programs of ACC through their invaluable professional knowledge and active engagement with ACC.



Fellowship Programs

To the ACC, a personalized approach in programming is paramount in creating a truly impactful fellowship experience in the lives of individuals and in their professional development.



Program Overview

The ACC program aims to provide fellows with experiences they would not be able to access independently. These experiences may include meeting and collaborating with ACC fellows from other Asian countries and disciplines; having access to leading practitioners or scholars in ACC's network of contacts; developing professional ties and friendships that last a lifetime; receiving referrals to classes, workshops, or other







opportunities for personal and creative development; and taking curated excursions to cultural festivals or other cities and regions. These encounters and explorations often lead to discoveries and opportunities the fellow could not have foreseen.

VISUAL ARTS

ACC Cai Guo-Qiang Fellowship



Xu Zhe 徐喆 (Visual Art) is a conceptual artist based in Shanghai. Xu Zhe obtained his Bachelor of Arts degree from Shanghai Normal University in 2001. His work is largely interventionist and process-based, utilizing various mediums including installation and performance to expose, respond to, and reflect upon issues and absurdities in his urban surroundings. Xu has been featured in exhibitions in China and abroad, including the group exhibition Essential Matters — Moving Images from China (2015) at the Borusan Contemporary, Istanbul and the solo exhibition "Between Calmness and Seduction" (2014) at Antenna Space, Shanghai. He received a fellowship to research the history of the Vietnam War in the U.S. for a transnational art project on the historical and political relationship among countries.

HKETONY-ACC Fellowship



Li Tin Lun, Otto 李天倫 (Visual Art) is a new media artist in Hong Kong, with an oeuvre heavily influenced by his past experience as a concept artist in computer graphics animation. Li obtained his Bachelor and Master of Fine Arts degrees from The Chinese University of Hong Kong. His work uses pixels as a common motif to explore human sensory perceptions of nature, space, time, media, and technology and their mechanisms to create tangible reflections of their system structures. His latest work reconstructs sound data with pixel blocks to create a series of threedimensional sculptural 'Soundscapes' that capture the mood of a city and the spirit of daily lives, and recall a city's collective memory. He received a fellowship to undertake research and observation on recent developments in the visual arts in the U.S., as well as to seek stimulation for new creative developments. This HKETONY-ACC Fellowship has been made possible by the support of matching funds provided by the Hong Kong Arts Circle.

Mandarin Oriental Arts Fellowship



Jen Bervin (Visual Art) is visual artist and writer whose works combine text and textiles with conceptual elements and a minimalist's eye for the poetic and essential. Jen obtained her Bachelor of Arts degree from School of the Art Institute of Chicago and her Master of Arts degree in Creative Writing from University of Denver. Her work has been shown broadly in the U.S. and held in more than 30 international collections. She has received a fellowship to carry out research on traditional silk embroidery technique in China and early Chinese poetry for a large-scale multidisciplinary work to be premiered at the Massachusetts Museum of Contemporary Art.


PERFORMING ARTS

Asian Cultural Council Fellowship




Zhaxi Wangjia 扎西旺加 (Dance) is a contemporary dance artist, choreographer, and dance educator from Tibet who is currently based in Beijing. Zhaxi was trained in Tibetan and Chinese traditional dance at Minzu University of China where he received his bachelor's degree in dance in 2009. In the same year, he joined LDTX, Beijing, one of China's most esteemed modern dance companies, and began his choreographic work in 2012, when he created *Quiet Place* for the company. The fellowship will enable him to undertake workshops, dance classes, and related research in contemporary dance in the U.S.

Désirée and Hans Michael Jebsen Fellowship



Ho leong Cheng, Katy 何揚晴 (Music) is an accomplished violist and promising music educator from Macau. She has served as Principal Violist of the New Julliard Ensemble and the Texas Festival Orchestra, and has performed internationally with notable musicians, including Itzhak Perlman, Lang Lang, and Trey Li. Ho received the Julliard Summer Grant Award in 2014, through which she established "Project MusiKid" — a summer outreach project for under-privileged children in Macau to engage with music and art education. With Macau's artistic development on the rise, she is deeply committed to developing the region's music education. The fellowship will support her living expenses for the first year of doctorate studies in Music Education at Teachers College, Columbia University.

HKETONY-ACC Fellowship



Hui Ngo Shan, Steve 許敖山 (Music) is an experimental musician, composer, curator and sound artist. He received his Bachelor of Music (Honors) degree and Master of Music degree in Composition from the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA). Hui's work is based on collaboration, and often explores the boundaries in contemporary music, sound art, multimedia theater and underground subculture to generate discourses on established forms and creativity. Since his graduation from HKAPA in 2010, he has produced a diverse and prolific body of work ranging from sound installations, experimental Chinese music ensemble works, to contemporary cinematic opera pieces. The fellowship will allow him to undertake research and observation on experimental music activities in the U.S., as well as to meet contemporaries from different disciplines in the U.S. This HKETONY-ACC Fellowship has been made possible by the support of matching funds provided by the Hong Kong Arts Circle.

Hong Kong Alumni Fellowship



Wong Chun-Kwok 黃津珏 (Arts Criticism) is a researcher, cultural critic, and experimental musician who is currently pursuing his PhD degree in London. A major contributor to the alternative music venue Hidden Agenda, he is widely regarded as a cultural commentator and a leading voice on the issue of sustainability for alternative performing arts venues in Hong Kong, actively driving research and public discussions on gentrification and the development of art and subculture in Hong Kong. He has participated in a number of significant art projects including the 2012 Hong Kong People's Fringe Festival and the 2014 publication of *From the Factories*. The fellowship will enable him to conduct ethnographic research on street performers and alternative performing arts venues in the U.S.

Hong Kong Arts Circle Fellowship



Wong Tsz To 黃梓韜 (Music) is a budding cellist and music educator. Born and raised in Hong Kong, Wong graduated from the Chinese University of Hong Kong with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Music in 2015. He was named Finalist at the Eastern Music Festival Concerto Competition in 2014. In 2016, he won the Gold Prize at the Cleveland Cello Society Competition 2016 — Collegiate Division, and First Place at the American Protégé International Piano and Strings Competition. In 2016, Wong received a fellowship to support living expenses for his second year of master's studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he further studied cello performance and received training in using the Suzuki Method of Pedagogy, a music teaching method rarely taught but increasingly in demand in Hong Kong. He will continue his studies at Rice University in the coming year.

Lady Fung Music Fellowship



Shen Ting-Chia 沈庭嘉 (Music) is a promising young violinist currently in her final year of studies at the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts (HKAPA), where she is studying under esteemed Professor Michael Ma. Shen has received coaching from acclaimed violinists including Lu Siqing, Huang Bin and Ning Feng. She has won the Concerto Competition at HKAPA with Tchaikovsky's violin concerto and performed with the Academy Symphony Orchestra in 2016. Shen received a fellowship to take part in the Aspen Music Festival and School, under the baton of renowned conductors, including Robert Spano, Ludovic Morlot, Hugh Wolff, James Gaffigan, Miguel Harth-Bedoya, and Vasily Petrenko.

ARTS MANAGEMENT & CURATORSHIP

ACC Cai Guo-Qiang Fellowship



Li Jie 李杰 (Visual Art) is Chief Curator of Luxelake • A4 Art Museum, a museum in Chengdu committed to connecting international contemporary art with local artistic practices. Li received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Sichuan Fine Arts Institute, Chongqing in 2005, and his Master of Arts degree from Sichuan University's Art College in 2009. From 2007 to 2010, he served as Curator of the Sichuan University Art Museum. In addition to his work at Luxelake • A4 Art Museum, he is an independent curator and a practicing artist. He was invited by the Japan Foundation to participate in its young curator exchange program in 2016. Li received a fellowship to research the development of museums, public art institutions, and non-profit art spaces for contemporary art.

ACC Cai Guo-Qiang Fellowship




Wu Jianru 吳建儒 (Visual Art) is an art critic and an independent curator. She graduated from the Guangzhou Academy of Fine Arts with Bachelor of Art and Master of Art degrees in Art History, and soon after, served as a contributor to ARTFORUM International. From 2012 to 2017, she was Senior Editor of Leap Magazine, a bilingual bimonthly art magazine that centers on contemporary art coverage and cultural commentary on architecture, exhibition design, film, arts practices and cultural activities. As a curator, Wu also ran an alternative art space in a Beijing shopping center, where she presented research-oriented art projects. To further develop art criticism in China, Wu received a fellowship to observe contemporary art activities, explore the state of arts criticism, and engage with artists and curators in the U.S.

Altius Fellowship



Lai Wan Yin, Orlean 黎蘊賢 (Arts Administration) is a curator and producer. Noted for her interdisciplinary approach, Lai works adeptly across visual and performing arts and brings together artists and designers across genres and mediums to produce projects with distinctive cross-media integration and genre innovation. Her recent works include *Building Tails* — a comics-media art-storytelling exhibition, *Zoo as Metaphor* — a performative exhibition, as well as 1984 — a cinematic opera. Lai received a fellowship to undertake research and observation on the development of interdisciplinary art practice in the U.S., as well as to engage with peers in the field in the U.S. and Japan.

Xiaoyang Yu Fellowship



Feng Xue 馮雪 (Art History) is a curator and faculty member at The Central Academy of Fine Arts (CAFA). Her doctoral research addressed the growing awareness of the potential social and national impact of the visual arts in China, and investigated the influence of contemporary art and cultural strategy upon China's national identity and social development. Feng sees China's rich history of cultural traditions and its contemporary arts as a means of developing a channel for dialogue and reflection upon its national identity. To supplement her research on the influence of contemporary art and China's future cultural strategy and national art policies, she received a fellowship to research the WPA Federal Art Project (WPA/FAP) in the U.S. and survey art archive management in the U.S.

ARCHITECTURE

Hsin Chong - K.N. Godfrey Yeh Education Fund



Tsinghua – MIT Exchange Program

Qing Feng 青鋒 (Architecture) is Associate Professor of Architectural History and Theory at the Tsinghua University School of Architecture. Qing holds a PhD in Architectural History and Theory from the University of Edinburgh and currently serves as Assistant Editor-in-Chief for the World Architecture journal. His research is engaged with the theoretical and philosophical aspects of architecture, including modern architectural history and theory, contemporary architectural theory, criticism of contemporary Chinese architecture, and the theory and practice of architecture design. Through the fellowship, he will be participating in the Special Program for Urban and Regional Studies program at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.



Young Architects' Award

Mui Sze-Wa, Sarah 梅詩華 (Architecture) is Design Director and Co-Founder of One Bite Design Studio, a Hong Kong multidisciplinary design practice. She is actively engaged with the community through her work as an exhibitor and curator. She served as Curator for the community-based arts organization, Very Hong Kong in 2013 and has been a designer for Urban Diary since then. With a focus on creating a sustainable future for the ageing community, Mui will undertake a fellowship to meet with non-government organizations in the U.S. that work creatively with these populations.

Applications

ACC opens its applications annually and awards fellowships for arts and humanities-related exploration, study, research and creative projects that involve international travel and cultural exchange between Asia and the U.S. and between countries in Asia.

In selecting suitable fellows, ACC has always placed great emphasis on the search for individuals with unique potential and motivation, in the belief that individual commitment and talent are the most important prerequisites for further training and travel, the surest insurance of productive future activities.

ACC accepts applications in the fall for fellowship programs to take place in the following year. Applicants from China, Hong Kong and Macau are welcome to contact ACC Hong Kong for application details.






Amount of fellowships and grants given worldwide in 2016:
